This guide was created by the Durham Local Immigration Partnership (DLIP) for newcomers looking to find rental housing in Durham Region, Ontario, Canada, with limited financial resources. The journey to finding housing can be long and challenging due to the current housing shortage. We want to support you through this process and have put together a list of resources that you will need to find housing, including assistance that you may be eligible to receive and supports available to guide you through each step of the process.

About the Durham Local Immigration Partnership

The Durham Local Immigration Partnership (DLIP) is a multi-sectoral partnership that works to improve the capacity of local settlement and non-settlement partners to serve newcomers in Durham Region. Today, it boasts a membership of more than 100 partners representing all levels of government, settlement and non-settlement service providers. About settling in Durham Region

Durham Region is made up of eight local area municipalities, the City of Pickering, Town of Ajax, Town of Whitby, City of Oshawa, Municipality of Clarington, Township of Scugog, Township of Brock and Township of Uxbridge. Across the region, you will find a variety of spaces that can be rented from urban settings near regional transit to rural locations closer to nature and the waterfront. Services are available to help you navigate the process of securing a rental unit such as an apartment, room or house. It is important to note that the process can look different for each rental space.



Overview of the Newcomer Housing Journey



This resource will review four components that support you in securing a rental unit.

Identification

Identification is required to secure housing. You can use any form of Government-issued Canadian identification, such as passports and immigration papers.

Employment

There are also employment services that can support you in finding employment by providing mentoring, and tips on how to prepare resume and for interviews, among other programs. These supports can be beneficial to finding the right employer and workplace. You will also need to show bank statements or a letter of employment to secure a unit.

Housing

There are several types of rental spaces available, including apartments, rooms, houses, and basements. Assistance is available to guide you through the process of securing a rental unit.

Financial Assistance

There are programs available that can help with paying your last month's rent. You will most likely need to show that a lease is in place to access them.

Identification



Identification is required to secure housing. You can use any form of Canadian-issued government such as a passport. To request identification, review the options available below.

If you lose your immigration papers you will have to contact Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), by phone 1-888-242-2100 or through their webform called <u>Client</u> <u>Support Centre services</u> (https://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-

Ontario Photo Card

Service Ontario can assist with an identification (ID) called the <u>Ontario Photo Card</u> (ontario.ca/page/ontario-photo-card). This is an official identification accepted in lieu of a driver's license. To apply, you will need a birth certificate and/or immigration documentation. You can use the Ontario Photo Card for government applications such as for an Ontario health card called the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) card, employment and more.

Employment



Typically, rental applications require bank statements or proof of employment such as letter of employment or an offer letter. Employment services are available throughout Durham Region. Many of these organizations provide resources and training to support you with finding employment, including mentorship programs; and training on how to apply for a job (i.e., preparing a resume), interview and other programs. These supports can be beneficial in helping you find the right employer and workplace.

Housing Assistance

There are a variety of spaces that can be rented. Supports are available to help you navigate how to secure a rental unit such as an apartment, room, house or basement. The process can look different for each space. It can be complicated and overwhelming to find a place to rent but, there are supports that can help you navigate your search such as outreach workers (more information is listed below).

If you prefer to look on your own, review the, <u>"Where to find online apartment listings"</u> <u>document (</u>durham.ca/en/living-here/resources/Documents/Housing-Shelters-and-Homelessness/Renters-Toolkit/Where-to-Find-Online-Apartment-Listings.pdf). However, outreach workers understand the process and can help you look for a place to rent. They have relationships with landlords that will be respectful of your rights, as well as how to navigate requirements that many landlords ask for that newcomers may not have yet, such as a credit score. Real estate agents are also available to help, at no cost.

Community Housing

Durham Region has community housing, which offers both affordable, market housing for individuals and families, as well as rent-geared-to-income (RGI) for people with low income. If you are a citizen, permanent resident or have applied for permanent residence, refugee or refugee claimant status refugee or refugee claimant, you can apply for RGI and other housing benefits through the <u>Durham Access to Social Housing (DASH)</u> (durham.ca/en/living-here/durham-access-to-social-housing-dash.aspx). Wait-list times can vary, but it is usually long depending on location and bedroom size. In the meantime, most people will need to look for housing in the private market.

*note that individuals who only have a student work visa or work permit are not eligible to apply.

Housing Search

Tenant Rights

As a tenant you have rights such as:

- The right to live in a property that is safe and in a good state of repair.
- The right to have your deposit returned at the end of the tenancy (provided that you meet the terms of your tenancy agreement).
- Protection against housing discrimination and overcharging rent.
- Legal recourse if the landlord lets the property become uninhabitable, and more.

The Landlord Tribunal Board provides information about its practices and procedures and the rights and responsibilities of landlords and tenants under the *Residential Tenancies Act*. For more information on your rights, visit the Landlord and Tenant Board (TribunalOntario.ca/ltb/)

Outreach workers can also inform you of your rights as a tenant, which is very important before you sign a lease. CDCD and Durham Region's outreach team offer Rent Smart Workshops to provide important information on how to protect yourself while you are a tenant.

The organizations listed below have outreach workers that can help you complete rental applications and housing stability fund forms. They can also provide support with eviction prevention and mediation with landlords.

Know Your Rights!

Not every landlord will give you the correct information. They may also add clauses to your lease that are not legal. Examples of clauses that are not enforceable include no pets, no smokers, several months of rent in advance and more. It is also important that the unit that you are considering to rent is up to building and fire codes. For instance, a basement with a bedroom should have a window to be a legal unit. Financial Assistance



To secure housing you will need your last month's rent. There are services that can help with funds for your last month's rent. You will likely need to show that a lease is in place.

Social assistance programs (such as Ontario Works) offer money to eligible individuals for living expenses including rent, medication, food and more. If you are already on Ontario Works, you have access to financial assistance for last month's rent and moving costs. You can contact CDCD to arrange it. If you don't have Ontario Works, CDCD can still provide support.

HSP helps Durham households who can generally pay their expenses, but due to unforeseen circumstances cannot meet their costs for a short period or must move to secure more affordable accommodations. HSP provides access to stability funds for rental arrears, utility arrears, moving costs, and last month's rent supports.

The HSP is only available to residents of Durham Region who have lived here for 3 or more months.

Your net household income must meet the low-income measure program limits.

If you live in north Durham, Community living can provide access to stability funds for rent arrears, utility arrears and last month's rent supports. You must have an immigration status in Canada and have assets less than \$50,000 (single person) and \$75,000 (couples and families).
